

Kia ora,

We are currently busy practising for the Cultural Festival on June 27th. This will take place at the stadium in Pahiatua. Although we are not performing until after 12 noon we need to be there by 9.45am. This is always a fantastic event and is even more special this year as we have Te Ringa Kaha performing for us. This is an adult group which has qualified for <u>Te Matatini</u> - Aotearoa's National Kapa Haka Competition. They will take to the stage immediately after our kura performs.

Last Wednesday our Year 6 and 7 children spent the day at Makuri along with students from other local rural schools. They spent the day in the bush. Thank you to Rob, Shona, Laura and Rachael who accompanied them. There are photos from the day later in the newsletter.

We have two weeks of term left. Next Thursday is the Cultural Festival and Friday is a public holiday for Matariki.

Our final week at school will see a focus on Matariki. On Monday Huia children will be helping to dig a hole for the hangi and prepare the vegetables. On Tuesday we will pull up the hangi, visit the native garden for karakia and share waiata in the hall as we enjoy the hangi together - buses will run at the normal time for children whose whanau are unable to join us. This hangi is for our school and community, everyone who lives in the Alfredton community and all of our whanau are invited. Please let us know as soon as possible if you are planning to come as we need numbers for catering purposes. Adult hangi - \$10, Child hangi - \$5. Thank you to those who have donated meat, it is much appreciated.

On Wednesday and Thursday Huia children will need to bring gumboots as they will be helping Pip to clean up the Native Garden. This is also part of our Matariki focus - taking care of our environment, particularly our whenua.

On the final day of term children will bring home their mid-year reports. There will be an opportunity early in Term 3 to discuss them with their teacher. Dates had to be moved due to the number of things happening towards the end of this term.

#### Behaviour

Currently, we are seeing some inappropriate behaviour from some of our students. We have a behaviour rubric which we follow. Some of these behaviours are moving towards the 'grey zone' and will result in a stand down if they continue. It is unacceptable to encourage or provoke children through inappropriate language or actions to fight as well as to actually begin a fight. I am in the process of working with an outside provider to introduce a program which will support all our children to deal with unkind / bullying behaviours as a victim, a perpetrator and an observer.

Consequences: Restorative Discussion with Class Teacher / Injured Party.	Consequences: Parents will be asked to meet with the Principal for a discussion.			
10 mins thinking time at the next play sitting on the deck in front of the staffroom, or in the foyer if wet or cold.	Depending on the severity of the action police / other agencies may become involved.


