Kia ora,

We would like to welcome Tohu Haddon and Octavia Couling to Alfredton School. Both have joined Tui Class. It is lovely to see so many smiling faces enjoying their learning in our junior room. We would also like to welcome Ocean Batchelor who has joined our staff as a teacher aide in Tui class. We currently have a vacancy for a driver on one of our school bus runs. We are also looking for relief bus drivers. If you would like to find out more about these positions please contact me as soon as possible. All training and licensing costs are paid for by the school.

Thank you to all parents who have notified us of times when their child will be off the bus at the end of the day. If your child is either leaving school early, or being collected at the end of the day please notify school. If it is a last minute arrangement go with your child to tell the teacher who is responsible for their bus that you are taking them. Yesterday we spent time looking for a child who had been collected but no one had been told. This meant that a run was late leaving. Please continue to let the driver know if your child is off the bus in a morning e.g. sickness or attending an event off site. When children attend sporting events you still need to let the driver know that they are off the bus.

All children who are off the bus should go and tell their 'bus teacher' that they are leaving as arrangements can sometimes change. Fortunately 90% of our children do this.

If your child is absent from school, please email or phone school to tell us and to give a reason why. Notifying the driver is not enough. School has to record a reason on the roll. We have a choice of present, medical, justified (e.g. tangi, special event, appointment - proof of appointment required), unjustified (e.g. hair appointment, their birthday) or truant. If you don't give us a reason we have no option but to put the absence as truant. If you know that your child could have been marked as truant, please email us to let us know why they were absent and we can change the roll.

Notices for learning conversations went home yesterday. There are only spaces left on Tuesday for Huia parents who may still want to make an appointment. Huia parents should come to Kiwi class and Tui parents to Tui class. All appointments will run to time. If you feel that you would like longer than the 10 minutes we can make another appointment for you at a mutually suitable time.

Curriculum Changes

Over the past week you will no doubt have seen in the media that the government is releasing a new updated maths curriculum earlier than planned. This was originally to have been implemented by 2026 however the goal posts have moved yet again and now it is to be implemented at the start of 2025 alongside the revised English curriculum. This will pose a problem for all schools as we are still to receive copies of both the maths and English documents. The draft maths curriculum was released for consultation on August 12th. The draft English curriculum is set to be released for consultation on the 26th August. Final copies of both curriculums are expected to be in schools by term 4. There will be a Teacher Only Day in term 4 for staff to work on the new curriculum requirements. Natasha will also attend a training session led by Core Education in November to dive deeper into the new English curriculum. I will keep you updated on curriculum changes as they happen.

Despite the data released by the government about the supposed low attainment by Year 8 students I can assure you that this is not the case at Alfredton School. The data was taken from a study carried out by the Curriculum Insights and Progress Study. As explained by Charles Darr, one of the lead researchers involved in the study quoted by the government: "We've been tracking student achievement in mathematics at Year 8 for more than ten years, and in that time, there has been no evidence for improvement or decline. We do have a new draft curriculum, however, and the provisional benchmarking exercise we carried out indicates it requires a higher level of proficiency than the 2007 curriculum."

The government concluded that around 50,000 children in Year 8 failed to meet the expected benchmark last year. This is a very interesting conclusion to reach as only 853 students took part in the study from just 42 schools. For such a conclusion to be reached a larger number of students would have to take part in the study. The students who took part were tested against benchmarks for the new draft curriculum, not the curriculum they had been taught. This also poses data quality issues. Another survey by NMSSA found that 88% of Year 4 children and 45% of Year 8 children were achieving above expected benchmarks.

However flawed the data is, there is obviously a need for the curriculum to change as it is clearly no longer meeting the needs of children in 2024. Rushing to introduce quick changes will only touch the tip of the iceberg and the worry is that a lasting effect will not be seen. Textbooks are not always the answer, especially ones which don't reflect the diversity of the children in our schools as they are imported from overseas.

Having read through the draft maths curriculum I can see that the requirements for each year group has increased. I am hopeful that this will not be a problem for the majority of our children who are all achieving well with our current curriculum. We use national standardised assessments (Easttle) to assess in years 4 to 8 and our children scored well in mid-year assessments with 23% achieving at the expected level and 65% achieving above. There is still work to do but it is not all doom and gloom and what and how we teach maths at Alfredton is obviously working for a significant number of children.

Towards the end of this term and during term 4 Natasha and Kate will be taking part in Structured Literacy PLD. The providers we have chosen to use are Learning Matters. We will be introducing into Tui class what they are learning throughout term 4 and into 2025. This will also complement current teaching where phonics is regularly taught, as are many principles of structured literacy. Natasha will keep Tui parents informed via Class Dojo.

Huia class has been using Writer's Toolbox for two terms. We are already seeing an improvement in their writing. This is very pleasing and we hope to see continued improvement in the second half of the year.


We will have a Sausage Sizzle available on the day, which we sell with a bag of chippies and a drink
